When we have in English pairs of narrow and wide vowels, such as those in gate, get (ey, e), feet, fit (i, i), fool, full (u, Q), the symbol for the long narrow vowel is more suitable for the corresponding short narrow vowel in French than the symbols e, i, u would be, because these would mislead the English people by suggesting that the vowels ought to be wide, and more open than they really are. So ey, i and u are used for the vowels in Eii!, ftm, ioui. Many English people fail to pronounce the French nasal vowel an, and use on instead, as in encore, carte blanche, pronounced by them owkor, kartblowsh.
